

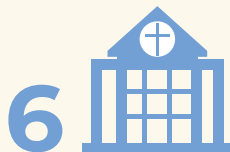

My name is Scott Ripberger and I have been fortunate to work in education for the past 21 years at Prince of Peace Catholic School in Plano as a teacher, administrator, coach, mentor, and now counselor. As a counselor, my focus is on the formation of the whole child, including academic, spiritual, social, and emotional growth. Children need and seek a sense of connection and belonging from their parents, peers, and others in their life. Educators and staff in our Catholic schools have a great mission of forming authentic bonds and connections, which promote positive self-worth and self-esteem in students.

I am blessed to be able to talk to individuals, small groups, and entire classes about things like God, virtues, and our faith. I could not imagine being as effective as a counselor without being able to remind students to seek and look at things through a Christ-centered lens. My most important role is to be an advocate for all the students. I hope they all leave our Catholic schools, feeling a sense of connection and genuine care from their peers and adults, and carry that forward as they interact with others.

Every *Ministry*...

Pastoral Juvenil Hispana (PJH) is a Hispanic young adult ministry model designed for those who would benefit from participating in a culturally specific ministry. This ministry takes place in participating parishes and supports the overall mission of the Office of Youth, Young Adults, and Campus Ministries to form missionary leaders.

In the past year, PJH has supported 16 parishes and movements within the 7 deaneries, hosted 7 formational offerings, and translated the Ascend: New Ministry Leader Orientation to support 71 volunteer ministry leaders. Currently, PJH directly supports 420 Hispanic young adults in the Diocese of Dallas.



“There are a few things that come to mind immediately when thinking about the impact of PJH on my life. One of them for me is how it makes me get out of my comfort zone, consistently. If it was up to me, I’d be in the background minding my own business making sure no one sees me. PJH has made me grow a little bit in that aspect. I’ve done things that I’ve never imagined doing from acting in front of people, to leading a play with the help of wonderful people, to opening up to people about God and the personal journeys I’ve had with Him. My faith has become stronger and I would attest this to the passing of my uncle because there was a moment where I thought ‘This might be where I bow out’ but throughout that journey, there were constant reminders of God being there so in a situation where I could’ve just walked away from the youth ministry and leave everything I’ve built up to that point, I didn’t... I stayed.

Selfishly of course I still wanted my uncle here, anything to not have my cousins and aunt suffer through it, but the will of God can be different from what we want and that’s where faith comes into play and that’s with prayer. It also has made me force myself to see what I need to work on. I have never been in a leadership role so to me everything is a lesson, so I’m learning as I go, learning to be comfortable in my decisions, learning from my mistakes, and most importantly learning to be patient knowing God will do right. All this to say it has helped me grow which I think is the point of a youth ministry. I’d argue it’s as important as any college course because it’s teaching you how to face life and how to overcome life under the belief and protection of God.”

Bishop Burns has called a diocesan Synod for the Diocese of Dallas in 2024. A synod is a meeting that takes place at a particular time, bringing together people appointed from varied backgrounds to discuss pastoral and administrative practices in a particular diocese. The entire synod process is conducted over 10 years with the assistance of the Synod Preparatory Commission and the participation of the faithful in the Diocese.

The Synod Preparatory Commission will host listening sessions through October 2023 to gather perspectives of the faithful that will be discussed at the Synod Meeting in 2024. Since the start of the listening sessions over 2,500 people have attended and more than 2,000 pages of data have been collected. Once the listening sessions have concluded, the Commission will then propose resolutions to Bishop Burns to assist him in setting the direction of the Church in the Diocese of Dallas. The final six years of the Synod will be dedicated to implementing the resolutions that Bishop Burns determines are most critical to advancing the Apostolic mission of the Church and creating opportunities for the faithful to encounter Christ. Bishop Burns invites everyone to take the opportunity to participate in Synod Listening Sessions.

Every Soul...

My name is Gary Garza and I have been involved in prison ministry for the last 27 years. I am currently serving as a Volunteer Prison Chaplain in two prisons. How does one begin their entry into prison ministry? Often people enter the ministry as the result of the incarceration of a friend or a family member. My entry began in 1996 when a friend received a 40-year sentence. Right then and there I decided to support my friend during his incarceration. I began to be part of an ongoing weekly Bible Study at the Tarrant County Jail hoping that one day I would be able to minister directly with my friend. For 16 months, I participated in the Bible Study program. In those 16 months, I learned about life within the county jail system. After 16 months my friend was sent to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ).

Strictly speaking not everyone is called to serve in a jail or prison environment. I began working in the prison ministry to support my friend via visits and as a pen pal. I learned that statistically speaking, after five years most incarcerated men and women stop getting visits and mail correspondence. The phrase, "out of sight and out of mind," takes them out of others' memory.

In August 2006, I began serving as Chaplain at the Hutchins State Jail and have been there for the last 17 years. With the help of a team pulled from across the Diocese, I was able to establish an ongoing RCIA program. Approximately 60 residents have received sacraments. I also established a team of men to support weekly communion services, including men in diaconate formation. As part of their formation, diaconate candidates serve in hospitals and prison settings as part of an 18-month practicum. My role is to help these men negotiate the TDCJ system so they can serve the men in residence. I have also had the honor of helping Bishop Burns come into the prison to celebrate Christmas Day Mass several years in a row.

Every *Vocation*...

My name is Deacon Parker Thompson. I was ordained a deacon by Bishop Burns on April 29, 2023, and, God willing, I will be ordained to the priesthood in 2024. I entered seminary with the Diocese of Dallas after I graduated from Jesuit College Preparatory School. As I finish my ninth year of priestly formation, I look back and see the numerous opportunities I've had in order to become the best priest God is calling me to be. These opportunities to help seminarians are all made possible because of the generous donors of the Bishop's Annual Appeal.



During the academic year, seminarians study the vast tradition and teachings of the Church, which include dogmatic theology, systematic and sacramental theology, scripture, and pastoral synthesis and application. Outside the academic year, seminarians participate in other formation programs as well. I also experienced two summers of Spanish immersion programs in Central America where I learned Spanish and learned the cultures of the hometowns where many of the faithful of Dallas come from. Many families I encountered have relatives now living in our Diocese. Other experiences include living at different parishes for a summer or a whole year, giving me the opportunity to learn the day-to-day workings of a parish and the life of a priest. I was also sent to participate in the Program of Priestly Formation at Creighton University where we learned and participated in the spiritual tradition of the Church, learned about the saints, and did an eight-day silent retreat. I also served as the ICU Chaplain at Baylor University Medical Center in downtown Dallas where I ministered and encountered people in the most difficult times of their lives.

I never would have experienced these things on my own. Rather, under the direction and support of the Bishop, I have experienced and entered into these programs for the purpose to be a well-formed and faithful priest. These experiences have changed my life, and for that, I am deeply grateful. However, I am not the only seminarian to have had these experiences. All seminarians go through a rigorous multi-year formation program so that we might better love the people of the Diocese



of Dallas. These programs require financial support, but the payoff is having well-formed, faithful, and loving priests who have learned how to minister and be present for the faithful of Dallas amidst the different joys and difficulties of life. I am beyond grateful to you, the supporters of the Bishop's Annual Appeal, who have funded these programs and life-changing experiences. As I complete my final year of formation to the priesthood, I ask for your continued prayers and support of me and all the seminarians, that we might faithfully serve you as priests in the Diocese of Dallas.

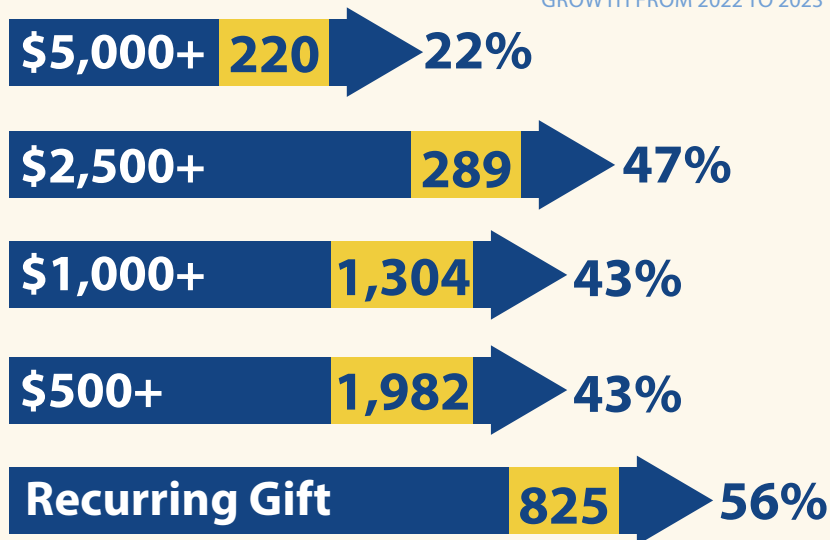


Thank you from Bishop Kelly
